THE EDITOR'S RAMBLES

I THINK THERE'S AN ELECTRIC CAR IN MY FUTURE!

Last issue I rambled about electric cars that might be in our collective future. This month, I'll confess ... I'm targeting 2018 as the year to sell a vehicle or two, a project car or two, and buy an electric car.

The term "electric car" as used today needs clarification, as it can be full electric, plug-in hybrid (electric propulsion for 20-40 miles or more) then petrol powered, or hybrid. I suppose a fourth category would be the unique BMW i3 REX which has an electric drive train combined with a 700cc motor-

cycle engine running a generator when the range required exceeds that provided by batteries alone. It isn't a plug-in hybrid as the engine/generator combo is intended for range extension (hence, REX) not unlimited distance.

If a person is to have one car, I think the plug-in hybrid is the best choice as the electrical system would probably provide 90% or better of the miles driven miles annually. Full electrics, the better of which have a range in the low 200 mile class, still are inadequate to serve as one's sole car.

While converting our car port to a garage I had 50 amp wiring put in the wall near where an electric would sit. In the next few months I'll do some test drives and lots of research. So at this point what's my guess as to the winner? I'm betting on a low mileage 2015 BMW i3 REX, currently around \$20k.

London Brighton Commemorative Run 2017

The Old English Car Club has hosted this drive for many years and PACMOG has supported the event by participating. Many of the PACMOG members are also members of the OECC so it is nice that we are able to support both clubs. We put on the Hearts and Tarts run in February and the OECC takes part in that run with us. It is nice to have the cross club cooperation and camaraderie. Four Morgans and a Jaguar represented PACMOG on this day.

This year we again started from the Delta Town and Country Inn just south of the Massey Tunnel and finished the drive at the Fox and Fiddle Pub in Langley. The drive commemorates the London-Brighton Run that takes place in November each year with vehicles built prior to 1905. Quoting Tom Purves, Chairman of the Royal Automobile Club,

"In true tradition, the Run takes place on the first Sunday of every November and commemorates the Emancipation Run of 14 November 1896, which celebrated the passing into law of the Locomotives on the Highway Act. It was this Act that raised the speed limit for 'light locomotives' from 4 mph to 14 mph and abolished the requirement for these vehicles to be preceded by a man on foot. The early law required the man on foot to carry a red flag but that requirement was abolished in 1878. The Locomotive Act was still widely known as the 'Red Flag Act' and, to mark this milestone, a red flag



was symbolically destroyed at the start of the Emancipation Run, just as it is today before the start of the Run in Hyde Park."

The OECC had their own Lord Winchelsea, who read the proclamation and, along with Walter Reynolds, performed the symbolic ripping of the red flag. After a group photo, we were off on a great drive with fair skies. We were lucky this day as the hearty were able to go top-down, as there was no rain. 50 British cars drove out of the parking lot and off to a wonderful day of British motoring!

Our route took us along Highway 10 and Colebrook Road to the King George Boulevard and Crescent Beach







Road. We had our rest stop at Blackie Spit. Along the way, it was interesting to see the bird activity in the fields as the bald eagles are starting to return for overwintering. The first Snow Geese mingled with the Canada Geese in one field while another was filled with ducks, hiding from the hunters.

One MGB GT pulled over on 128A Street, never to be seen again. I hope he did not have a mechanical or medical problem and was able to rejoin us later, although nobody seemed to know what happened. Hopefully, somebody pulled over to lend assistance or inquire if there was a problem. We must look out for each other first and remember we are never in a race.

Our drive along Colebrook Road was a little bit spirited, allowing for cobwebs and carbon to be blown from our engines. It reminded me of a Ladner-Bellingham run many years ago when a group of us left the rest stop at Birch Bay early allowing us to make the speed limit at least for a few miles. In those early years, the procedure was to follow-the-leader and we were not to pass any cars in front of us. We were lined up by registration number and asked to keep that order. This was a problem for some of the modern cars, such as Aston Martins, that were having difficulty driving down the freeway at 40 MPH rather than the posted 60MPH or 100 KPH. Numbers dwindled and the OECC has to be congratulated for improving the format of the drive and making it more enjoyable for everyone.

Our drive took us along the waterfront of White Rock and through the back roads of Langley before we ended at the Fox and Fiddle Pub. It was great to see 81 people sharing a meal together, reminiscing of past runs and looking forward to the next motoring season.
